<u>Course Description:</u> This is a one credit course for EGH graduate students. The course consists of discussions and development of high quality written and oral critiques of peer-reviewed journal publications.

After 2 introductory sessions, during each of the following weeks one student will present an oral presentation regarding a scientific publication/manuscript and the other students will offer written critiques as well as participate in the discussion of the scientific article.

Depending upon the class size students will have 2-3 opportunities to present. The purpose is to develop critical thinking (and writing skills) in evaluating the scientific literature.

Course Pre-requisites: Graduate school enrollment

<u>Course Objectives and/or Goals:</u> After completing this course, the student should be able to:

- Have a fundamental understanding of how to critically evaluate examples of environmental and global health (EGH) scientific literature
- Be familiar with presenting oral summaries of the scientific literature;
- Be familiar with leading critical discussions of the scientific literature;

 Be familiar with how to draft a critique of scientific manuscript for a scientific journal;

<u>Course Materials (derived from PHC 6937, BSCH & EGH Journal Club):</u> During the first class student assignments for presentations will be made. Readings will be selected each week by the student presenter with the guidance of the instructor.

<u>Assignments (derived from PHC 6937, BSCH & EGH Journal Club):</u> Student presenters:

- >10 days before the student's journal club presentation date: the presenting student sends a proposed article in pdf format and 3 discussion questions to the course instructor(s) for approval.
- <u>>6 days before the student's journal club presentation date</u>: the instructor sends the approved article and 3 discussion questions to the class
- <u>Presentation day</u>: The student presents an oral presentation and leads the discussion regarding the article as follows:
 - 1) PowerPoint summary of scientific background (5 mins)
 - 2) PowerPoint summary of the scientific paper (5 mins)
 - 3) Lead discussion of the 3 discussion questions (40 mins)

EGH scientific topics include but are not limited to: Infectious agents, zoonotic diseases, environmental hazards (air, water, soil, food), toxicology, aquatic pathogens, airborne pathogens, vaccines, agricultural exposures, and global health.

Non-presenting students will prepare a 1-page review form (see last page of this document) and turn it in at the beginning of class.

Should a student be forced to miss class the instructor may ask the student to present a 2-page double-spaced review of the paper/manuscript in the following format:

- 1) Manuscript summary (1 page)
- 2) Major criticisms (at least 1/2 page)
- 3) Minor criticisms (at least 1/2 page)

<u>Course Requirements/Evaluation/Grading:</u> When students present more than 1 time their presentation scores will be averaged. Students will be evaluated by an average numeric grade score of their understanding of the topic/publication, oral presentation, use of visual aids, and discussion leadership (40%); an average numeric score of their weekly submitted written critiques (40%); and their class participation (20%).

Students who do their readings in advance of class, participate in discussions, and attend every session will earn an A for the class participation portion of the overall grade.

Final grades will be graded on a standard letter scale of A to E.
